Winter, Coldest season of the year between Autumn and Spring, the name comes from an old germanic word that means "Home of Water" and refers to the rain and the snow of winter.

It is commonly regarded as extending from the winter solstice, (years shortest day) December 20 or 21 to the vernal equinox (day and night are equal in length), March 20 or 21 to September 22 or 23.

The Solstice, the 2 months during the year when the sun travels the shortest path through the sky and therefore has the least daylight and longest night. After the solstice the days get longer and the day this happens on has become a

day of rebirth to us gardeners.

The season of dormancy, particularly in relation to crops, some plants die leaving their seeds. Others merely cease to grow until spring. Many Animals also become dormant, especially those who hibernate, and numerous insects die.

The appeal of gardening is multifaceted and wide in range. The garden is often the only place where someone without special training can exercise creative impulses of a designer, artist, technician and scientific observer in addition to many find it relaxing and therapeutic.

Is it not surprising that the garden, accorded respect as a part of nature and a place where contemplation holds a special place in the spiritual life of man.

February is a great month for contemplation, a great time to choose what plants we want to grow, read those seed catalog pages and decide where to plant and nurture our plants in our gardens this coming spring.

Location: Erin's Meadow Herb Farm - "Grow and edible herb container for fresh flavor all season"



Snow: A Poor Man's Fertilizer

Snows before or after the ground has thawed can yield some great benefits to your soil. As precipitation falls through the atmosphere, it collects atmospheric nitrogen which is in the NH2 form. Did you know that Snow delivers about two to twelve pounds of nitrogen per acre per year from the atmosphere to the soil.


