and education offerings, family visits here and you going to visit them there.




A few reminders on trip procedures - adhering to these guidelines will help us to continue to offer fun and educational experiences:


2025 Spring Fern/Geranium Sale




Scholarships



A Possible Solution to Alpha Gal Syndrome

Kat Rydz introduced Alpha Gal Syndrome (AGS) at the last membership meeting. Here is some additional information about this syndrome. AGS is a serious allergic reaction to alpha-gal, a sugar found in mammals, triggered by tick bites. My husband, Rick, had AGS for nine long months. It impacted many parts of our lives. Rick read the label of every single thing he ate. Eating out of our home was difficult, making travel challenging at best. The allergy may dissipate on its own over a period of years, or it may be a life-long problem.

We found a cure.

Some kind soul told us about Brandy Lynn, a licensed acupuncturist in Cookeville. She uses a simple technique using only one needle (the tiniest needle

you'll ever see). It is placed in a specific spot on the ear, covered with medical glue and a bandage. The needle remains in place for 3 weeks. This was a very quick procedure at an EXTREMELY REASONABLE cost.

Rick no longer has AGS problems. He combined two techniques to rid his body of the problem. He was extremely careful with his food choices and he used Ms.

Lynn's acupuncture. Our lives are now back to normal.


ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Reactions can be mild or life-threatening. Some things to know:

Did You Know the Magnolia Dates Back Over 95 Million Years?

Magnolia trees and shrubs are among the oldest flowering plants in existence, dating back over 95 million years.

These beautiful plants have not just witnessed the rise of dinosaurs but have also adapted uniquely to their environment.


One of the most interesting facts about Magnolias is that they evolved before bees appeared on Earth.

Instead of relying on bees for pollination, these ancient plants developed a unique partnership with beetles. Their tough flowers are specifically designed to endure the rough-and-tumble life of beetle pollinators.

Beetles are attracted to the fragrant blooms and, as they feast on the pollen, they inadvertently carry it from flower to flower, ensuring the plant's reproduction.


